**Founding Chair, Department of Public Health, College of Liberal Arts & Sciences, Wayne State University (June 2016-July 2020)**

Departmental Profile: This newly formed Department now houses almost 900 majors, 300 minors, 6 full-time faculty, 3 full-time staff, and approximately 20 part-time faculty. Additional full-time faculty in other units have partial appointments in the Department. Under my direction, the College opened the major and minor to enrollment in June 2016. Required courses were rolled out over a two-year period, and we had our first cohort of majors graduate in December 2017. Based on the successes of the new program, in 2019, the Wayne State Board of Governors approved a new undergraduate-serving Department of Public Health in the College to stabilize and resource the program. I transitioned from Founding Director to Founding Chair upon the establishment of the department. Additional information is available at <https://clas.wayne.edu/public-health>.

**Major Accomplishments and Responsibilities:**

- ***Curriculum Development and Launch***
  - Supervised the launch of all courses for the new major and minor over a two-year period, including eight required courses and multiple electives; trained all faculty on how to teach the required courses
  - Wrote the initial curriculum for all required courses that had to be developed, in consultation with MPH faculty
  - Developed relationships with all other health-related colleges and schools to discuss curriculum and instruction, recruitment and retention, and the potential for sharing resources
  - Developed and implemented initial assessment procedures for the new program
  - Developed and implemented all curricular requirements and academic policies for the program, in consultation with others

- Developed and launched an accelerated track (4+1 program) for high-performing undergraduates to “fast-track” to the MPH program
- Coordinated the initial articulation of transfer credit from other universities and colleges into this new program

- After four years, this program is the third largest major in the college

  - Transitioned new Chair to lead the new Department in Summer/Fall 2020; continued to support new Chair on a regular basis in 2020-2021

The Institute houses ~15 research faculty, 15-20 pre-doctoral students, several postdocs, 13 full-time staff members, a deputy director and a director.
