
- 1. Address enrollment challenges and opportunities to increase the number of majors in the College. *Strategic Direction I. Enhance Strength and Stability*
 - The number of majors in the Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts increased in FY22. Overall, it was a modest increase. The majority of the disciplines in the College are applied (dance, music, art, theatre, creative technologies). They were greatly impacted by canceled prospective student campus visits and auditions. Current and prospective students expressed concerns about participating in voice and instrumental ensembles during the COVID-19 months. Although all precautions were taken, many students did not want to perform in masks or have individual music lessons with faculty. Courses taught in studios (glassblowing, ceramics, sculpture, printmaking, photography, painting, graphic design) had limited student enrollments due to social distance protocols.
 - The Creative Technologies Program continued to grow enrollment with students choosing Game Design, Interdisciplinary Technologies, and the new Audio and Music Production sequences as majors. From fall 2015 to fall 2021, the number of undergraduate and graduate students has doubled, from 80 to 160. In the Wonsook Kim School of Art, the Graphic Design Program has grown from 24 majors in fall 2015 to 149 majors in fall 2021. Both of these programs are technology-intensive and have clear paths to career readiness. The College anticipates increased enrollment growth for these and several other sequences for fall 2022.

- 2. Develop college-wide strategies to improve equity, diversity, and inclusion efforts. *Strategic Direction III: Nurture Diversity and Inclusion*
 - Accomplishments include establishing school and college-wide EDI committees. The college committee is led by the College's associate dean and director of the School of Theatre and Dance and includes representatives from the Wonsook Kim School of Art,

School of Music, School of Theatre and Dance, and Creative Technologies Program faculty and student groups. These are active committees, often working collaboratively on programming and presentations by EDI guest speakers. EDI accomplishments for the College's schools and programs are listed under I.D.

- 3. Offer new technology-intensive curriculum and programs that attract prospective students and retain continuing students. *Strategic Direction II: Foster Innovation*
 - The College has developed new technology-intensive programs that were offered in 2021-2022. They include Game Design, Audio and Music Production, and Film and Media Studies. Faculty are teaching courses in Virtual Reality and Augmented Reality in Creative Technologies and Music conducting courses. Traditional disciplines such as drawing and animation, painting, printmaking, graphic design, and extended media have become increasingly technology-rich to stimulate design-thinking and "making" processes.
- 4. Renovate facilities and purchase equipment to support teaching in classrooms, studios and labs, and performance spaces. *Strategic Direction I: Enhance Strength and Stability; Strategic Direction II: Foster Innovation*
 - The Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts continues to improve its equipment, instruments, and tools inventory, as well as its performance venues, classrooms, studios, and labs.
 - In fall 2021, the College was named an "All-Steinway School." Thirteen new Steinway pianos were purchased to add to existing Steinway inventory. This initiative was supported by a gift from donor Wonsook Kim. All music majors are required to complete piano courses. The "All-Steinway School" designation provides an excellent opportunity to attract prospective students, faculty, and guest performers to ISU.
 - In spring 2021, large-scale Wenger acoustical shells were purchased for the Center for the Performing Arts Concert Hall. The shells are professional grade and support professional and university orchestras and choral ensembles.
 - The new Game Design classroom (CVA 140) was completed and made available for classes in 2021-2022. CVA 17 is being renovated to support the new Audio and Music Production sequence in fall 2022. The Printmaking studios are being renovated to accommodate courses in silk screen techniques.
 - The Illinois Shakespeare Festival, in collaboration with ISU Planning and Construction purchased and installed a new HVAC system for the Ewing Theatre to meet AEA guidelines for air quality/circulation in backstage rooms.
 - The State of Illinois CDB is coordinating a \$3M project to improve several of the

College's restrooms in Fine Arts buildings not scheduled to be renovated in the Fine Arts Project.

- Planning is underway for renovation to parts of the first, second, and third floors of Cook Hall. It is anticipated that the School of Music administrative suite and piano lab will move to the first floor of Cook Hall when completed.
- 5. Work with ISU Planning & Construction, Ratio and HGA Architects, and the State of Illinois CDB to plan all learning spaces, technology, public spaces, equipment, FF&E, and art and architecture for the \$61.9M Fine Arts Rehabilitation Project. *Strategic Direction I: Enhance Strength and Stability; Strategic Direction II: Foster Innovation*
 - The College's dean, associate dean, and facilities planning coordinator worked daily with representatives from ISU Planning & Construction, Ratio and HGA architectural firms, and the State of Illinois Capital Development Board on all facets of the \$61.9M project, including plans for learning spaces, technology, MEP, landscaping, AIA, and FF&E. As a result, final plans will be completed in summer 2022.
- Work with ISU Planning & Construction on renovation plans for "temporary" buildings to be used for parts of the College during the 2-to-3-year Fine Arts Rehabilitation Project construction (Milner Library, Julian Hall, Weavers, and Williams Hall). Strategic Direction I: Enhance Strength and Stability
 - The College's associate dean and facilities planning coordinator worked with ISU Planning & Construction to create detailed plans for parts of the College impacted by the Fine Arts Rehabilitation Project to move classrooms, offices, and furniture and equipment to temporary buildings for 1-to-3 years. During 2021-2022, renovations for the College were made to Milner Library, Julian Hall, and Weavers for summer 2022 occupancy. Williams Hall will also be used.
- 7. Foster global connections through international partnerships, collaborative undergraduate graduate and faculty research, and scholarly production. *Strategic Direction II: Foster Innovation; Strategic Direction IV: Enrich Engagement*
 - The College's international partnerships in China have been stalled due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the current political climate. Study abroad plans for summer 2022 include Study Abroad in Art (Italy) and Study Abroad in Music (UK).
- 8. Develop the (new) fall 2022 Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts Strategic Initiative Student Project grants opportunity for undergraduate and graduate students. *Strategic Direction II: Foster Innovation*
 - A significant amount of Foundation funds was reserved for student project grants.

Guidelines and proposal application forms were created in spring 2022. Funding will be available to students starting in fall 2022 and will continue in spring 2023.

- 9. Secure individual safe and accessible visual art and design studios for Master of Fine Arts students. *Strategic Direction II: Foster Innovation*
 - The College planned to lease space at Eastland Mall for 20 MFA studios. ISU Planning & Construction provided light construction to build each studio. Students will occupy them in fall 2022.
- 10. Complete searches for 6 tenure-track faculty and the director of the School of Music. *Strategic Direction I: Enhance Strength and Stability*
 - All FY22 searches were completed in March 2022. The searches included: director of the School of Music; Applied Violin; Game Design; Game Design and Image Making; Graphic Design; Film and Digital Media; and Art Education.
- 11. Increase visibility of the College's fine arts programs to enhance their identity and reputation on state, regional, and national levels. *Strategic Direction IV: Enrich Engagement*
 - University Galleries (UG), located in Uptown Normal, and the Illinois Shakespeare Festival (ISF), located at the Ewing Cultural Center, offered full seasons of exhibitions and performances throughout the year. They continued their outreach to artists and audiences beyond Illinois. Universities Galleries presented world-class artists and worked with them to create contemporary exhibitions and museum-quality publications. During the months affected by COVID-19 protocols, Universities Galleries and the Illinois Shakespeare Festival remained nimble, adjusting their schedules, amending contracts with artists due to the shifting schedules and protocols, and canceling events and performances when alerted by the State of Illinois and ISU. In addition, both UG and ISF designed innovative programming to connect virtually with students, schools, professional colleagues and organizations, and the public throughout the year.
 - The College hosted over 366 art exhibitions and artist lectures; student, faculty, guest recitals and lectures, and ensemble concerts; and theatre and dance performances scheduled during the 2021-2022 academic year.
- 12. Create opportunities to engage the campus and Central Illinois communities. *Strategic Direction IV: Enrich Engagement*

Examples include:

• The award-winning Illinois State University String Project offered low-cost instruction on

stringed instruments to children in the community. The program supported existing public school string programs and provided a string education to children who are homeschooled or enrolled in schools where no string program is available. String Project also supported teacher training experience for ISU's string majors who served as teaching assistants. The children participated in a spring 2022 concert in the Center for the Performing Arts with the School of Music's Symphony Orchestra.

- The Shakespeare Festival's Bard in a Box and Theatre for Young Audiences troupes regularly performed short versions of Shakespeare plays in schools, community venues, and at Ewing Cultural Center to make theatre accessible to K-12 students and teachers at the ISU lab schools, Bloomington-Normal schools, and rural schools in Central Illinois.
- University Galleries offered events and activities to engage the community each week. Examples include:
 - NCHS Sociology Responds to the Canary in the Lake was the culmination of a 2month collaboration with 55 sociology students at Normal Community High School. The project used Alice Hargrave's examination of climate change in her solo exhibition, <u>The Canary in the Lake</u>, as the basis of the students' own research of environmental issues through a sociological lens. A Town of Normal Harmon Arts Grant and University Galleries provided art materials and 8 sessions of instruction for the students. Their resulting works were on display at University Galleries.
 - Teen Art Group curated a group exhibition about experimental processes and environmental awareness for Summer 2022. The exhibition will feature artists Aaron Caldwell (alum), Fidenco Fifield-Perez, Jin Lee, Melissa Oresky, Rashod Taylor, and Selina Trepp.
 - Led exhibition tours and discussions for NAACP ACT-SO (Academic Cultural Technological Scientific Olympics for high school students); Unit 5 Entrepreneurship (students from both Normal Community High School and Normal West H.S.); Boys and Girls Club; Chiddix Junior High English as a Second Language classes; Washington High School (Washington, IL); and Franklin Middle School (Wheaton, IL)
- Two Graphic Design internship fairs provided an opportunity for numerous community partners and corporations to interact with current students seeking an internship.
- Alumni and Friend engagement and development initiatives included:
 - The College celebrated seven Alumni Day Honorees (four from Art, one from Music, and one from Creative Technologies) and hosted a tent for alumni

students, faculty, staff, retirees and their families during Homecoming.

- The dean's office, Wonsook Kim School of Art, School of Music, School of Theatre and Dance, the Creative Technologies Program, University Galleries, Illinois Shakespeare Festival, and Friends of the Arts participated in the fourth annual Birds Give Back day of giving. 215 gifts were made to featured funds in support of student scholarship, guest artist residencies, and programming. Over 40 faculty, staff, and students visited and made an in-person gift at a giving kiosk set up in the Center for the Performing Arts Lobby.
- Janet Allen '77 (SoTD), Executive Artistic Director of the Indiana Repertory Theatre in Indianapolis, IN was the 45th alum inducted into the Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts Hall of Fame.
- CreativeCon offered first-year students a chance to hear from fine arts alumni who shared information about their journey from Illinois State University to their current position.
- Alumni Engagement partnerships included:
 - Chicago reception and performance of *Good Night Oscar* with postshow discussion with Fine Arts alumnus Sean Hayes led by a member of Goodman Theatre's artistic department.
 - Wonsook Kim School of Art Glass program's 2-day "hot stuff" hands-on glass workshop.
 - Alumni and Friends Night at the Illinois Shakespeare Festival scheduled for July 2022.
- Illinois Shakespeare Festival will host the yearly John Stevens Memorial Golf Outing and end-of season Bard Bash during the summer 2022 Festival season.

C. Provide specific accomplishments related to Academic program development.

School of Theatre and Dance

- The proposal for the new Musical Theatre sequence was approved in fall 2021. New and revised courses were approved last spring. Auditions are required for admission.
- The proposal for the Acting sequence was approved in fall 2021. New and revised courses were approved last spring. Auditions are required for admission.

• The proposal for the new Stage Combat minor was approved in fall 2021. New and revised courses were approved last spring. This minor establishes Illinois State as one of only two universities in the State of Illinois with a minor in combat. The minor will collaborate with the Game Design sequence for motion capture.

Creative Technologies Program (CTK)

- The Audio and Music Production (AMP) sequence became available in spring 2022. This sequence will serve students interested in pursuing careers in the music industry.
- Creative Technologies initiated a 4 + 1 Accelerated Master's Degree. The redesigned MS program reduces the number of required credits from 39 to 33.
- In 2021, Creative Technologies Program faculty led the development of XR@ISU. The program has offered two VR courses and plan to grow Virtual and Augmented Reality sequences.
- Four new Game Design courses offered for the first time this academic year include Game Design II; CTK Game Design Capstone Projects (2); and graduate-level Experimental Technologies for Games.
- An XR degree EAB document is being prepared.
- CTK 302 Computer Programing for Creatives became a STEM-designated course in spring 2022.
- Selected Topics (new courses) offered this year include:
 - Fall 2021: Digital Painting; Live Audio Engineering; Speaker System Design; Composition and Design for Digital Media
 - Spring 2022: Design and Culture in Creative Technologies: Unity Fundamentals in VR; Digital Painting; Audio Production I; Mixing and Mastering; Sound Design for Video Games; Kinetic Sculpture; Foundations: Music Concepts; Foundations: Audio Theory

School of Music

School of Music faculty and staff participated in a number of curricular and program development sessions. Proposals are still in planning phases. They are:

- New Course Proposals
 - American Music (United States Traditions Gen Ed). This course will be beneficial to music majors and non-majors alike. The course will provide critical content on a diverse range of singular American music, including styles rooted in Black music. The course may be accepted as a course which counts for the new IDEAS graduation requirement.

- Jazz Improvisation Lab. Aimed at providing an opportunity for any music student to experiment with improvisation (as opposed to just jazz majors).
- Course Content Adjustment
 - MUS 217/263 The redistribution of content across these courses will alleviate the content-heavy MUS 263 course, which has recently plagued students in their junior year, and will provide more current general music content for all music teacher education majors.
 - MUS 100 Vibrant faculty discussion centered on building skill deficiencies has resulted in a reimagined freshman seminar that is singing-focused.
- General Education Support
 - Successfully offered MUS 275 for non-majors (AMALI credit) Summer 2021, with 60 students enrolled. The course will be offered again Summer 2022.
 - Over 2000 Gen Ed seats are offered/filled each year, and courses are taught by both TT and NTT faculty. Courses cover a diverse range of music, including from the Western canon, World Music, Black Music, Jazz, and popular music.

D. Provide specific accomplishments related to Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion.

The Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts and the Wonsook Kim School of Art, School of Music, School of Theatre and Dance, and Creative Technologies Program made significant progress with EDI initiatives in FY22. Examples include:

School of Theatre and Dance (SOTD)

- The EDI Committee completed an extensive survey of students in spring 2021 and fall 2021. SOTD contracted alum Brett Werner-Powell to process the raw data. The result was an insightful picture of the backgrounds, perspectives, and identities of students in the program, aggregated by sequence. The results are proving useful in discussions about curriculum development, student support systems, and other planning considerations.
- The committee organized one DEI faculty and staff retreat each semester. In fall 2021, the retreat focused on recognizing whiteness and white supremacy in university disciplines, programs, and curriculum. In spring 2022, the retreat focused on implementing curricular change. Faculty and staff were given time to meet, while being guided by questions developed by the committee. The goal of this retreat was to create concrete action steps for each sub-discipline area and to begin a critical look at the "core" coursework that is common to all sequences.

- 50% of the Mainstage productions were written and/or adapted by BIPOC playwrights and have content related to diversity, cultural identity, or anti-racism. 50% of the Mainstage productions were also directed by MFA students who are BIPOC students.
- SOTD was one of the first venues to produce *Fairview*, by African-American playwright Jackie Sibblies Drury. The 2019 Pulitzer Prize winner for drama, *Fairview* was described by the Pulitzer committee as "a hard-hitting drama that examines race in a high conceptual, layered structure, ultimately bringing audiences into the actors' community to face deep-seated prejudices."
- Guest Artists:
 - <u>Devon Glover, a.k.a. Sonnet Man</u>: Glover performed and led a workshop for SOTD students in a visit cosponsored by the Illinois Shakespeare Festival and FreeStage. "The Sonnet Man sets Shakespeare's love sonnets to Hip Hop," working with largely young audiences.
 - Jerrilyn Lanier Duckworth, MFA: Lanier is the Guest Costume Designer for *Fairview* and was in residence in March 2022 to lead workshops for the school and community about African-American hair and makeup design for the theatre.
 - Morgan "Mo" Williams: Williams is the Artistic Director of Water Street Dance Milwaukee, a past season finalist on *So You Think You Can Dance* (SYTYCD) and has danced professionally since the age of 18. Williams cast and set a dance piece on Illinois State Dance Theatre dancers for the Spring 2022 Concert: *Emergence*.
 - Tidtaya Sinutoke, playwright and composer: Sinutoke is the <u>2022 winner of the Diverse</u> <u>Voices Playwriting Initiative</u> and will be on campus in April for a week-long workshop of her winning play, *Dear Mr. C.* The play tells the story of a Thai immigrant musical theatre writer living in New York who tries to find peace after learning that their mother has been diagnosed with cancer.
- Five SOTD faculty members attended the two-week "Reinvent Your Course for Diversity" summer workshop: Laina Carney, Jimmy Chrismon, Shannon Epplett, Maggie Marlin-Hess, and Robert Quinlan.
- Fall and spring retreats focused on DEI development for faculty and staff. The fall 2021 retreat topic was on recognizing white supremacy and white privilege in the discipline and academy, with guest presenter Mayuko Nakamura from CTLT. The spring retreat, as mentioned above, focused on DEI in the curriculum.
- Several faculty members have been involved across the University in DEI-related service capacities. Faculty members Li Zeng and Shannon Epplett (Sault Ste. Marie Chippewa) both serve on the President's Diversity and Inclusion Council. Both led workshops at the spring EDI

Leader's Circle Day on February 14. Zeng is also the current president of AsiaConnect. Director Ann Haugo and Shannon Epplett serve on the Indigenous Advocacy and Student Support Team.

Wonsook Kim School of Art

• Associate Professor in Art Archana Shekara and colleague Professor Maura Toro-Morn led the campus and community-wide <u>National Immigrants Day Project</u>. The art installation *I Am Here.* We Are Here. We Belong. honored the contributions of immigrants and featured 1000 4x6 individual flags that lined the University's Quad. Program speakers included President Kinsey, Provost Tarhule, and several members of the campus and community-serving organizations.

University Galleries

- Three solo exhibition catalogues focused on: one LGBTQ woman artist and two women artists of color.
- One group exhibition catalogue featured 19 artists from 7 countries (Egypt, India, Scotland, Mexico, United States, Peru, and England) who are primarily women, and/or LGBTQ, and/or of color.
- The four catalogues collectively featured texts by 14 writers who are of color, and/or women, and/or LGBTQ. Three of the four catalogues were designed by a woman designer of color. Topics include: racialized language, immigration, labor inequity, social justice, protest, overlooked histories, legacies of women artists and writers, and the surveillance state. All writers and designers receive honoraria for their contributions.

School of Music

- The eight members of School of Music's EDI committee (REDI) committee Representing Equity, Diversity and Inclusion meet monthly. The committee worked through several initiatives, aligned with internal goals, as well as the Pillars of Progress presented to ISU's EDI community this year. Infusing and tracking EDI content in our general core curriculum has been one area of focus. The EDI statement which the committee drafted was referenced and used in tenure-track search posting this year. At the committee's recommendation, the School's African Drumming and Dance ensemble and a jazz ensemble were invited for the first time to perform as part of the Annual Music for the Holidays concerts. The committee is working to develop an enewsletter on EDI topics to be sent to the department internally on a monthly or bi-monthly basis. The committee expects to host one or two listening sessions during the spring semester. The committee is a resource for the music student Multicultural RSO that was recently started. Two members of the EDI committee also serve on the Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts EDI committee and attended the fall and spring ISU EDI symposia.
